NEIGHBOURHOOD INFRASTRUCTURE STRATEGY

DELRAY HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

In December 2022, the project team expanded the catchment area for the Delray Home Improvement Program, a \$4 million (CDN)



Community Benefits Plan investment in homes surrounding the Gordie Howe International Bridge US Port of Entry.

In addition to the existing catchment areas, residents in the Carbon Works neighbourhood and south of West Jefferson Avenue can now apply for free home repairs from a pre-approved repair/replacement list, with a per-house cap of \$20,000 (USD).

As of January 2023, 65 homes have been repaired or are in the process of receiving repairs.

Expanded catchment area of the Delray Home Improvement Program near the US Port of Entry in Detroit.

Applications for the Delray Home Improvement Program will be accepted until 2024 or until funding is exhausted. Applications are accepted and processed on a first-come, first-served basis.

COMMUNITY BENEFITS PLAN UPDATES 2023

The Neighbourhood Infrastructure Strategy is a \$20 million (CDN) direct community investment on both sides of the border. In 2019, approximately \$14.6 million (CDN) was allocated to 29 projects in Windsor and Detroit. With implementation of the Plan at the midway point of its five-year term, the project team accepted several new proposals and undertook community consultation to review the current priorities of the neighbourhoods closest to the project.

As a result, new investment opportunities worth \$2.3 million (CDN) have been identified to bring further benefits to the local communities of Sandwich/west Windsor and Delray/Southwest Detroit. Eleven new projects are being added to the Plan, along with additional funding to six existing initiatives. Projects will be delivered by identified partners between 2023 and 2024. Remaining Neighbourhood Infrastructure Strategy funds will be allocated in 2024.

Project representatives announced an increase in funding for the Community Organization Investment initiative on November 30, 2022.

We wish to acknowledge that the land in Canada where the Gordie Howe International Bridge project is being constructed sits on Anishinaabe Territory. The Anishinaabeg in the Windsor area are known as the Three Fires Confederacy which consists of the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Potawatomi Nations. This land has also served as a place of refuge for the Huron/Wendat people.

Youth Mental Health Services

Indigenous Youth Programming and **Events**

Two Pow Wow events will be hosted, along with March break and summer camp programming to engage local Indigenous and non-Indigenous secondary-school students.

Southwest Detroit Youth Programming

Partner: Detroit Hispanic
Development Corporation (DHDC)

Afterschool and summer programming to be offered to youth at DHDC and the Delray Community Center, providing culturally appropriate programs and services.

Youth Environmental Program Partner: The Greening of Detroit

The *TreeKeepers Kids Program* is an environmental education program designed to engage students in three Southwest Detroit schools through tree planting at neighbourhood schools or parks.

Green Infrastructure and Programming

Partner: Congress of Communities (COC)

The youth-driven community center will offer green programming, community education and undergo infrastructure improvements.

EXPANSION OF EXISTING INITIATIVES

Expand Adjacent Trails to Connect to the Gordie Howe International Bridge

Partner: City of Windsor

Funding to widen the Matchett Road underpass as part of a municipal multi-use path from Malden Park to Broadway Avenue.

Neighbourhood Green Improvements

Partner: Essex Region Conservation Authority (ERCA) Funding for three community tree planting events in Sandwich area parks.

Community Organization Investment (COI) Grants Partner: Local Community Organizations

Increase in funding from \$50,000 to \$100,000 (CDN) per country for the 2023 and 2024 funding cycles to support projects delivered by non-profit or charitable organizations in the host communities.

Windsor-Detroit Cross River Tour Organization: Project Team Delivery

Increase funding to support longterm costs of the interpretive signage in both Canada and the US.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT AND PARTICIPATION STRATEGY

TRADES-SPECIFIC WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT STEERING COMMITTEE

In November 2022, the project's international Trades-Specific Workforce Development Steering Committee met in-person for the first time at the Carpenters and Millwrights Training Center in Detroit. This committee includes the project team, participating labour unions, Tier 1 subcontractors and workforce development partners. The meeting included an overview of the project's progress and created an opportunity for cross-border networking and discussion on workforce development in the Windsor-Detroit region.

ABOUT COMMUNITY BENEFITS

On the Gordie Howe International Bridge project, community benefits are identified opportunities that can advance economic, social or environmental conditions for local communities. In developing the Community Benefits Plan, it was key that the initiatives selected for implementation would provide positive outcomes for the Windsor-Detroit region and specifically focus on enhancing the Sandwich and Delray communities, the neighbourhoods closest to the project area.

Community benefits initiatives are delivered by the project team, a collaboration between Windsor-Detroit Bridge Authority, Bridging North America and the State of Michigan.

The Community Benefits Plan is comprised of two components:



THE NEIGHBOURHOOD INFRASTRUCTURE STRATEGY focuses on collaborating with stakeholders and community members through consultation to develop a community betterments strategy based on priorities identified through public consultation, including: community partnerships, community safety and connections, economic benefits, and/or aesthetics and landscaping.



THE WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT AND PARTICIPATION STRATEGY is geared toward engaging businesses and individuals and focuses on supporting workforce, training and pre-apprenticeship/apprenticeship opportunities.

THE GORDIE HOWE INTERNATIONAL BRIDGE PROJECT is a once-in-a-generation undertaking. Not only will the project deliver much-needed transportation improvements for international travellers, it will also provide jobs and opportunities for growth to the Windsor, Ontario and Detroit, Michigan region and includes features that make this project truly distinctive. A key project element is the inclusion of a Community Benefits Plan.
