


SANDWICH STREET IMPROVEMENTS

- Approximately 3 km of Sandwich St. from the intersection of Sandwich St and Ojibway Pkwy to just south of the Rosedale Avenue roundabout will see infrastructure improvements.
- Specific consultation related to this work is anticipated to occur later this year.
- Improvements will align with Sandwich Town Heritage plans and guidelines.
- Sandwich will be fully re-paved in accordance with municipal standards.
- All sidewalks within the corridor will be replaced and will meet accessibility standards.
- Bump outs will be incorporated at some intersections to enhance pedestrian safety.
- This work will be coordinated with City of Windsor sewer work to be undertaken in this area.
- Sandwich Street enhancements as part of the Community Benefits Plan will also be coordinated.



DETROIT STREET IMPROVEMENTS

- Roadway resurfacing and improvements to Jefferson Avenue, Campbell Street, Green Street and Fort Street. This work is anticipated to occur in 2023.
- Five new pedestrian bridges will be constructed over I-75.
- Decorative fencing: to be installed around perimeter of US POE with irrigated landscaping
- Fort Street bike path: protected 6-foot bike path along both sides of Fort St. from Green to Junction Streets
- Deciduous shade trees planted every 25 feet along Jefferson, Fort between Green and Junction Streets and other area streets.
- Continuous, accessible sidewalks: fully accessible sidewalks installed along Service Drive to connect each pedestrian bridge



PROJECT SUSTAINABILITY

The goals and objectives of our sustainability framework include:

- Maintain safety and security
- Create a culture of leadership
- Design for durability and resiliency
- Provide economic opportunity
- Conserve non-renewable resources
- Protect the natural world

Examples include:

- Diverse workforce goals
- Bridge lighting and energy efficiency
- Material resource conservation
- Native plant landscaping
- Integration of a Peregrine falcon box



PUBLIC ART

Three components of Public Art will be incorporated into the Gordie Howe International Bridge project:

- dramatic and dynamic bridge lighting at night
- an artistic building facade at the Canadian Port of Entry
- a standalone Indigenous art commission to be completed by a Canadian Indigenous artist

A call for artists has been completed and each commission is beginning the artist selection process.

Additional details will be shared as the process continues, including an opportunity for public consultation.









COVID-19 PREVENTATIVE MEASURES

- Construction activities continue on both sides of the border in compliance with directives issued by the governments of Canada, Ontario and Michigan
- WDBA and BNA have implemented numerous precautions to support worker safety.
- WDBA staff are working from home and the three office locations are closed.
- Safety protocols and procedures at the construction site, include (but not limited to):
 - All workers are required to participate in daily screening
 - Masks available to workers that must work inside the recommended 2-metre/6-foot social distancing zone.
 - Cross-border travel has been suspended except for essential workers
 - Increased cleaning of office spaces along with hand sanitizer availability
 - Implementation of a rotational work from home program for BNA staff
 - No meetings with more than 5 people with the primary use of conference calls and virtual meeting tools.
 - Only essential visitors are allowed on the project site.
- All employees who may be working on site, including subcontractors, are taking all recommended precautions seriously to ensure their health and safety.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE: CANADIAN POE

- All preparatory activities undertaken by WDBA to help BNA expedite work at the Canadian POE are complete.
- Design will be complete in 2020.
- The installation of 150,000 wick drains will be completed in July.
- Surcharge fill placement is underway with over 1.4 billion pounds placed.
- Ongoing construction and environmental monitoring.




CONSTRUCTION UPDATE: BRIDGE SITES

Canadian and US Bridge Sites

- Design is ongoing
- Wind tunnel testing to gauge stability of the bridge structure design and a review of the bridge soffits are complete
- Completed seawall modifications
- All 18 drilled shafts are complete in both Canada and the US
- Tower footing work is underway along with tower crane assembly on both sides of the border
- Structure construction is expected to be visible on the ground this year.
- Ongoing construction and environmental monitoring.





CONSTRUCTION UPDATE: US POE

- Design is ongoing
- Utility relocations are ongoing
- Implementation of road closures and fencing around the site perimeter
- Major earthworks including wick drain installation and surcharge placement are ongoing. Over 50,000 wick drains of 105,000 have been installed and over 550,000 tonnes of engineered fill has been placed.
- Ongoing construction and environmental monitoring.



CONSTRUCTION UPDATE: MI INTERCHANGE

- Design is nearing completion
- Mainline construction is ongoing
- Ongoing construction and environmental monitoring.
- Phase One construction of the Michigan Interchange, including demolition and reconstruction of three I-75 road bridges is underway:

Springwells Street Bridge

- Demolition is complete
- Piledriving is complete
- The Northbound bridge abutment is complete
- Formwork/rebar work to construct the southbound bridge abutment is ongoing
- Next steps include median pier construction, girder placement and deck construction.
- Ramp and Service Drive reconstruction to begin over the coming months.



CONSTRUCTION UPDATE CONT'D: MI INTERCHANGE

Livernois Avenue Bridge


- Demolition is complete
- Piledriving is complete
- Formwork/rebar work to construct north and south bridge abutments is ongoing
- Next steps include, median pier construction, girder placement and deck construction.
- Ramp reconstruction to begin over the coming months.

Clark Street Bridge

- Demolition is complete
- Piledriving on south abutment is ongoing.
- Once piling is complete, next steps include, north and south abutment construction, median pier construction, girder placement and deck construction.



UPCOMING AND TEMPORARY US CLOSURES

Beginning in July, the third and final phase of US POE road closures will be implemented. These include:

Temporary Closures:

- Cavalry Street will close between the northbound I-75 Service Drive and Fort Street, from July 10, 2020, until October 30, 2021.
- Cavalry Street will close between Anthon Street (South of Fort) to West Jefferson Avenue, from July 10, 2020, until June 30, 2023.
- Military Street will close between the northbound I-75 Service Drive and Fort Street, from July 10, 2020, until October 30, 2021.

Long-Term Closures:

- The Livernois Avenue diversion will close between Livernois Avenue and Dragoon Street, on July 10, 2020.
- Military Street will close between Fort Street and West Jefferson Avenue, on July 10, 2020.

UPCOMING AND TEMPORARY US CLOSURES

Long-Term Closures, Continued:

- Dragoon Street will close over a long term between Fort Street and West Jefferson Avenue, on July 6, 2020.
- Driggs Street will close over a long term between Cavalry Street and Campbell Street on July 6, 2020.
- Harvey Street will close over a long term between Cavalry Street and Campbell Street on July 6, 2020.
- Reeder Street will close over a long term between Cavalry Street and Campbell Street on July 6, 2020.
- Hussar Street will close over a long term between Military Street and Cavalry Street on July 6, 2020.

UPCOMING CLOSURE AT CLARK STREET & THE SOUTHBOUND I-75 SERVICE DRIVE

- The southbound I-75 Clark Street on-and-off ramps will be closed for approximately five (5) weeks starting in summer 2020.
- Southbound I-75 Service Drive will be closed at West Grand Boulevard, with access to local traffic only, and completely closed between Scotten Avenue and McKinstry Street for approximately five (5) weeks starting Summer 2020.
- Southbound traffic from the Vernor Highway to Scotten Avenue will be closed with access to local traffic only, and no outlet, for approximately five (5) weeks starting Summer 2020.
- Southbound traffic from the Vernor Highway to Clark Street will be closed with access to local traffic only, and no outlet, for approximately five (5) weeks starting Summer 2020.

UPCOMING CLOSURES: WEST END AND FORT STREET

- West End Street will be closed between Fort Street and Melville Street, from July 6 until October 2, 2020. Local traffic and business traffic will have access to West End Street between Norfolk Southern Railroad to Melville Street. Maps and detailed detour routes available at gordiehoweinternationalbridge.com.
- Traffic on Fort Street between Central Avenue and west of Springwells Street will be reduced to one lane each for westbound and eastbound traffic from July 6 until October 2, 2020.
 Business along Fort Street access will be maintained during this closure. Maps and detailed detour routes available at gordiehoweinternationalbridge.com.

UPCOMING CLOSURES: NORTHBOUND AND SOUTHBOUND I-75 TRAFFIC SHIFT

In summer 2020, the three lanes of I-75 Southbound and Northbound traffic will be shifted toward the shoulder to create space for bridge piers that will be constructed in the median areas.

This work will involve both day and night closures to move temporary concrete barrier at shoulder areas, install new concrete barrier at the median areas and remove and install new pavement markings.

The closures will be mobile closures and temporary lane and ramp closures. The work to complete the traffic shift is anticipated to take approximately 8 days.

Mailings Notification to residents and businesses will begin in advance of construction through flyers and/or mailed letters to homes and businesses in the area.	Social Media The project's social media accounts also broadcast construction updates and road closure information.

BUSINESS ENGAGEMENT

US: In addition to established construction notification tactics, a long-term communications strategy is being developed with Southwest Detroit Business Association to assist the conveying project information throughout construction with the business community. Initiatives include:

- Targeted social media campaigns
- Leveraging key community partners
- Engaging marketing student
- Employee engagement
- Web page additions
- Assistance with the development of business resources

CANADA: A similar plan will be implemented when Sandwich Street work moves forward. Additional information on timing of this work will be available later this year.



DELRAY HOME IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

- The Community Benefits Home Repair
 Program is anticipated to launch in summer 2020, and continue through to 2023,
 funding permitted.
- Initial target area includes properties located south of I-75 in Delray. Repairs that will be offered to eligible homes include:
 - Window replacement
 - HVAC system replacement
 - Insulation
 - Roof Repair

NEIGHBOURHOOD INFRASTRUCTURE STRATEGY IMPLEMENTATION

In winter 2020, the project team released funding to four Community Benefits Plan initiatives, two in Canada and two in the US, totaling more than \$475,000 (CDN).

CANADIAN INITIATIVES:



Ojibway Park Wildlife Eco-Passage

The City of Windsor received \$250,000 in advance funding to undertake an Environmental Assessment for a proposed eco-passage between Black Oak Heritage Park and Ojibway Park that will provide safe passage for area wildlife. This is part of a larger investment of \$15 million in seed funding to be released to the City should all approvals, permits and funds be secured to progress the Eco-Passage project.



Sandwich Community Art Project

Life After Fifty will use \$20,000 in funding to launch West End Art Project, a community art project that will engage local youth and the surrounding community in the development and coordination of a representative art project that celebrates the culture and heritage of Sandwich/west Windsor.

Bridge to Prosperity Program, Southwest Detroit Business Association




QUESTION AND COMPLAINT PROCESS
